Editorial (Jeremy Tullett)

Although I glory in the title of *Technical Competence Manager & Assessing Agency Manager*, a subsidiary role that I hold is that of line (resource) manager for a group of document controllers who work out of a range of offices scattered around England.

This has nothing to do with the competence management part of my job, and has been almost an accidental acquisition, but that is how the job has evolved, and I now have nine of these folk to manage, as well as two workplace assessors.

A couple of weeks ago, I had to travel to Bristol to carry out some interviews for a new document control post there.

After a period of advertising, Human Resources collected about 30 CVs from various applicants. As is usual for posts like this, HR immediately discounted a half of the applicants for having absurdly high salary aspirations for the job, for having no relevant skills or experience, or for being patently from foreign applicants who were really looking for any opportunity for a work permit.

Having decided to interview the remaining 14 (it will become apparent why I elected to interview 14 people), I set up 12 slots in three days (yes), with a view to commuting from Derby to Bristol each day.

Of the 14 invited, two failed to provide some further information that we requested, and never responded to the invitation. A further five also ignored their invitations, leaving just seven. Over the next week, three more pulled out after having found jobs elsewhere – but at least they told us.

(If you're wondering about the attrition rate here, it is fairly typical of similar interviews that I have carried out to date.)

By now, it was apparent that I would not need three days in Bristol, as has three slots filled for day one, and one for day two, with no takers for the final day.

Day one passed successfully, with the three candidates all being worth seeing. On day two, the sole candidate booked in failed to show up, thereby completely wasting my trip. Said candidate described herself as "an ambitious young professional ... with excellent interpersonal skills". However, these skills apparently do not extend to calling in to cancel appointments with a potential employer. Said person also hit the busy button on her phone when we tried to find out where she'd got to. So, RH of Bristol, don't bother applying for a job with us again, as we won't be wasting our time with you.

Having spoken with colleagues, it seems that this sort of behaviour is not uncommon among applicants for other roles in our business, including various flavours of engineers. Has it always been thus, or is this a new trend for Generation X, Generation Y and/or Millennials that we old folk will just have to come to terms with? Would any readers like to send me their interview experiences?

I find it incredible that, at a time when some campaigners say people can't find jobs because immigrants are taking them all, applicants be quite so blasé about invitations from firms who actually want to talk to them.

And here's the final irony. I would have given the job to any of the three that turned up, but I could only select one. The successful applicant is a Polish national.

What's New at MidCon 2016? (Jeremy Tullett)

We have reserved the Hallmark Inn dining room from 10am on both Saturday and Sunday, providing even more space for gaming. This should be ample to address the difficulty that some people had in finding tables during Saturday and Sunday.

This space will be used for two purposes. Firstly, we will use this space as a dedicated area for **'lighter games' and for first time convention visitors**, under the control of David Clasby.

Secondly, Ben Bateson will be running **a Decathlon mini-event** - should take about 45 minutes, probably on Sunday afternoon. It will also be available as a general overflow area, but if gamers resident in the Inn wish to base themselves there anyway, that will be fine.

The highly successful **Bring and Buy games sale** will again be in the Hallmark Inn, but will now have even more space, as we have reserved both of the (adjoining) meeting rooms for the event.

Delighted as we are with the burgeoning success of MidCon, increasing numbers are starting to put pressure on the space available for players to play. There is the possibility of booking the function room at the Aston Court Hotel, just across the road, but if anyone has any suggestions for an alternative location in the East or West Midlands, which could accommodate up to 300 gamers, with accommodation for around 150, and which has good parking, and is convenient for public transport, do let us know.

There are some hotels near East Midlands airport, which certainly have good rates, and plenty of space, but the drawback is that there are no pubs and restaurants in the area. While Derby city centre is easily enough reached on the airport bus or by taxi, this isn't really very convenient for the not insignificant number of people who do like to go out in the evenings.

We have considered booking the entire Hallmark Hotel and using the dining room as a gaming space, but that creates difficulties for those who wish to take formal evening meals there, and the opening offer for a deal like this from the hotel was absurdly expensive, and left the committee carrying a large financial risk. We considered it an impractical solution.

For 2016, we have booked every available meeting room in the Hotel, and also the Inn dining room, as above. This has increased our costs, and we have to increase the registration fees accordingly, our first rise since 2012. Please see the next page for details.

Welcome to Progress Report Number 2. ManorCon is fast approaching, so here are the final details you will need before you get there.

Don't forget your chit!

As in previous years, we are issuing chits to everyone who booked accommodation in advance and paid in full. If you've done both of these, you should find a chit enclosed with this Progress Report.

The ManorCon Registration Desk and the University desk will both be in the entrance to Stamford Court.

The University desk will be handing out the keys, so if you have a chit, you should go to their desk. If you do not – or you need to change your booking in some way, you should go to the ManorCon Registration Desk. If you forget to take your chit with you, then you will have to go to the ManorCon Registration Desk for a new one. Please note: your receipt CANNOT be exchanged for a room key, only your chit can.

If there is no chit included with this mailing, this is probably for one of the following reasons: a) we think you owe us money; b) you are non-resident; c) we may have made a mistake; or d) you haven't booked... In any case, don't worry about it - just come to the ManorCon Registration Desk when you arrive. We will not be sending out any further chits before the convention.

NEWS

New Venue

While the accommodation in John Foster Hall will be the same as the last 3 years, the rest of the convention will be across the road in Stamford Court (where we will actually have slightly more space than in John Foster Hall).

Gaming rooms

There are a number of gaming rooms. The main gaming hall is where the ad-hoc gaming will mostly take place. It's also where all the food will be served. There are also rooms for the Diplomacy tournament, Second Hand Games Stall, a quiet gaming room, and another general gaming room.

The gaming rooms will all be open from Breakfast until the last person leaves the room.

Food and Drink

The bar will be open 2pm to 1am Friday, noon to 1am Saturday, noon to 1am Sunday and noon to 2pm Monday. Note that due to the licensing laws you are not allowed to bring your own alcohol onto the site. Tea and Coffee are available from the bar, whenever it is open.

Other facilities

The convention is 15-20 minutes walk from Oadby centre. Oadby is a suburban centre on the outskirts of Leicester, which has a collection of shops, restaurants, etc. There is also a large Asda between the convention and Oadby. If Oadby does not provide all the facilities you are looking for,

then it is about 3 miles from the convention to Leicester City Centre.

Selling sessions will be Friday 7.30pm to 9pm and Saturday 2pm to 3pm with pack up by sellers by 4pm Saturday. All games must be collected by 6pm Saturday.

Parking

You are welcome to park in any University car park. There is a map of where these are at the end of this article.

John Foster (where the accommodation is) has a deceptively large amount of parking available – around 65 spaces in total – but these are all in bays, which take a few cars each. You are welcome to park in any marked bay on the site, but it may take a little driving around to find an empty space.

Stamford Court shares its car park with Bowder Court (which we've previously used for en-suite accommodation). This is a larger car park than John Foster, and is the best choice if you want easy access to your car while you're gaming.

You can also park in any other Leicester University Car Park. Please do not park on the road, as while it does not have parking restrictions, the University is required to keep their delegates from parking on the road. There should be car-parking attendants on duty to help you.

When you arrive....

If you are not staying in the University and do not owe us any money, simply collect your badge and programme booklet from the table near the ManorCon Registration Desk. If you have booked accommodation in advance, do not need to make any changes to your booking, and have your chit with you, simply report to the University desk to pick up your room key, and then collect your badge and programme booklet.

If you want to make changes to your booked accommodation, or if you still owe us money, or if you have forgotten your chit, you will need to report to the ManorCon Registration Desk first.

Anyone who has not pre-booked will also need to go to the ManorCon Registration Desk. We will have plenty of rooms available on the door, although they may not all be as close to the main hall as the pre-booked rooms. Once you have registered with us, we will issue you with a chit to be exchanged for your room key. We will also sort out your name badge, any money owing, etc.

Please try to arrange your transport so as not to arrive before ManorCon opens at 2pm on Friday. If you are on public transport and you will be arriving early because that is what the timetable says, or the drive is quicker than you think and you do end up arriving early, you will be able to drop your bags off, but you will not be able to get into the gaming hall. You are welcome to arrive at any time after 2pm on Friday, although if it is after 11pm, the ManorCon Registration Desk may be closed.

Late Arrivals and Changes of Plan

If you plan to arrive on the Friday evening after 11pm, or have transport difficulties and end up arriving late, please let us know. Ring the ManorCon mobile on 07340 048313. If you haven't prebooked accommodation but subsequently decide that you do want to stay over, please let us know (either via the ManorCon Registration Desk if open, otherwise track down the committee member on duty) before 11pm on the night in question, as we will have difficulties finding extra rooms after this point.

And when you leave.....

PLEASE NOTE: you **must** vacate your room and return your key by 9:30am on the day of your departure. All room keys should be returned to John Foster reception.

Tournaments

Some of the tournaments at ManorCon are Ad-hoc. Just play a game when you want, and put the results in the envelope. We anticipate ad-hoc tournaments for 18XX only. The non-Ad-hoc tournaments are as follows:

Diplomacy: The tournament will consist of three rounds: the first on Friday night at 7pm, the others on Saturday and Sunday at 10am. You need to sign up by 6.30pm on Friday to play in round 1, 9.30am on Saturday for round 2 and 9:30am on Sunday for round 3. The prize giving will be completed by 6pm on Sunday.

All games will be played to 1909, and the traditional ManorCon scoring system will be used. For full details, please see the programme booklet. Up-to-date information will be posted on the Diplomacy notice board.

Croquet is a four round knockout tournament. Entries can be made up until breakfast on the Saturday morning, at which point the draw will be done. Advance entries are welcomed for those who will not be arriving at ManorCon before Saturday morning; contact Steve Jones via the ManorCon email address, info@manorcon.org.uk. The draw will be posted on the general notice board. The knockout tournament is open to everyone except last year's champion, and is for the Croquet Challenge trophy; the winner will then play Mick Haytack for the Croquet Champion trophy.

Prodigals Club is run by Paul Grogan of Gaming Rules! The tournament will take place sometime Friday or Saturday. It will probably be 3 rounds, depending on number of players. Prodigals Club is the spiritual successor to Last Will, where the aim of the game is to lose all your money, your votes, and your friends. Paul will be available to teach people how to play before the tournament if anyone is interested.

Nippon is run by Paul Grogan of Gaming Rules! The tournament will take place probably on Saturday. It will be 2-3 rounds depending on the number of players. Again, Paul will be available to teach anyone this game before the tournament starts. Prize Support provided by What's Your Game.

Midnight Party will as usual be run at midnight each night.

Pop Quiz: The pop quiz will as usual be run in the bar area on Saturday night.

Programme Booklet

When you arrive at ManorCon, don't forget to pick up your programme booklet and look through it. It will contain all sorts of useful information such as maps of the building and surrounding area plus directions to the nearest shops, ATMs and restaurants, instructions for finding a committee member, what to do if you have a problem, opening hours of the bar and the canteen, details of the tournaments, and lots more. Directions.... or how to make sure you find us

Public transport directions first:

By air

The nearest airport is Nottingham East Midlands (www.eastmidlandsairport.com), which has flights to various European destinations and other parts of the UK (see for details).

Other relatively convenient airports served by low-cost airlines are London Stansted (www.stansted-airport-guide.co.uk/) and Luton (http://www.luton-airport-guide.co.uk/). Intercontinental travellers are likely to have to use Birmingham International, London Gatwick or London Heathrow.

The following sections describe how to get to Leicester (either to the main railway station or to the bus station). Once there follow the instructions below for getting from the city centre to John Foster Hall.

By air, from Birmingham International Airport

Take the free Air-Rail Link to the Birmingham International station - it only takes a couple of minutes. Buy a ticket to Leicester. Take any train to Birmingham New Street (frequent). Change there and take a CrossCountry train to Leicester (approximately every 30 minutes). The total journey time is about 1h 20m. Alternatively take the scheduled bus service to Coleshill Parkway and change there onto the CrossCountry train to Leicester. The total journey time is about 1h 10m.

By air, from Nottingham East Midlands Airport

Take the Leicester Skylink bus from the airport to Leicester City Centre (hourly during the day, every other hour in the evening; for timetable see www.skylink.co.uk). The journey time is under an hour.

Alternatively take the Loughborough Skylink bus from the airport to Loughborough station (half-hourly during the day, hourly in the evening; for timetable see www.skylink.co.uk) and then any train from there to Leicester (at least two per hour). The bus journey time from the airport to Loughborough station is about 30 minutes, the train journey time from there to Leicester about 15 minutes.

By air, from London Gatwick

Follow the signs in the airport to the station (if you have arrived at the North Terminal, this will involve using the transit to the South Terminal).

Buy a ticket to Leicester, specifying that you will NOT be travelling on the Gatwick Express service. Take a First Capital Connect train to London St Pancras (every 30 minutes). From there take an East Midlands Trains train to Leicester (every 30 minutes). The total journey time is about 2h 20m. Alternatively continue on the First Capital Connect train to Luton or Luton Airport Parkway and change onto the East Midlands Trains train there. This avoids the short walk between the subsurface and over ground parts of London St Pancras station, but there is only one train to Leicester per hour from each of Luton and Luton Airport Parkway, so you must find out which station it is correct to change at.

By air, from London Heathrow

Follow the signs in the airport to the station. There are three stations - one for Terminal 4, one for Terminal 5 and one for Terminals 1, 2 and 3. The following instructions are valid for all the stations.

Buy an Underground ticket to Zone 1, take the Piccadilly Line from Heathrow to Kings Cross St Pancras (frequent), and then buy a rail ticket to Leicester and take an East Midlands Trains train from London St Pancras to Leicester (approximately every 30 minutes). The total journey time is about 2h 30m.

Alternatively - this is a more expensive option - buy a ticket to Leicester valid for use on Heathrow Express services (this will cover both parts of the train journey and also the cross- London transfer on the Circle Line). Take the Heathrow Express train to London Paddington (every 15 minutes). Then take the Circle Line to Kings Cross St Pancras (frequent), and then an East Midlands Trains train from London St Pancras to Leicester (approximately every 30 minutes). The total journey time is about 2h 20m.

By air, via London Stansted Airport

Buy a ticket to Leicester. Take a direct Central Trains train to Leicester (hourly). The journey time is about 2h 30m.

By air, via Luton Airport

Take the free shuttle bus to Luton Airport Parkway station - it's only just over a mile. Buy a ticket to Leicester. Take a direct East Midlands Trains train to Leicester (hourly). The journey time is about an hour.

By coach

Though not always as fast as trains, coaches provide direct and cheap links between Leicester (St Margaret's Bus Station) and many other cities. Find out more information on bus routes operated by National Express. www.nationalexpress.com Booking line on: 08717 818181. Disabled Persons Travel Helpline: 08717 818179. Textphone: 0121 455 0086.

By train

Details of train times can be found on www.nationalrail.co.uk.

The following paragraphs describe how to get to Leicester from various parts of the UK. Once there follow the instructions below for getting from the city centre to John Foster Hall.

There are direct East Midlands Trains services from Derby, London St Pancras (Eurostar services from Paris and Brussels arrive here), Nottingham and Sheffield.

- There are direct CrossCountry services from Birmingham New Street, Cambridge, Nuneaton and Peterborough.
- From much of the South and South East it will be quickest to travel via London, using the

Underground to cross London from the relevant rail terminus to St Pancras (though walking between Euston and St Pancras is also an option if you are lightly loaded). If, however, you have a direct service to Cambridge or Peterborough, it might be quicker to go that route.

- From stations such as Brighton and East Croydon that are served by First Capital Direct services, the cross-London journey on the Underground can be avoided by taking one of their trains to St Pancras.
- From the South West a CrossCountry service to Birmingham New Street and then a CrossCountry service from there to Leicester is likely to be the best route. Travelling via Birmingham New Street will probably also be the best route from South and mid Wales.
- From North Wales, the North West and parts of Scotland travelling via Birmingham New Street might be the best option, but if you have a direct service to Nuneaton, it's likely to be quicker to change there.
- From the North East and parts of Scotland the best options are likely to be either a CrossCountry service to Sheffield and then an East Midlands Trains service from there to Leicester, or a Virgin East Coast service to Peterborough and then a CrossCountry service from there to Leicester.

From the city centre

The easiest way to get to the venue is by taxi or by bus. There are taxi ranks at both the bus station and the railway station.

The 31/31A bus service stops immediately in front of the railway station and there are 8/6/4 buses per hour during the day on weekdays/Saturday/Sunday. Ask for the racecourse. The buses have screens that show what the next stop is: the best stop is called Victoria Court, and is just past the road on the left that leads to the Oadby campus (Stoughton Drive South), so after getting off, you need to walk back a little and turn right. It's next after a big three-way roundabout where the outer ring road joins the A6 from the right. If you see the Asda supermarket, you've gone past the stop and will need get off as soon as possible and walk back further! It's a 10-15 minute walk up Stoughton Drive South and then right along Manor Road to John Foster Hall and Stamford Court.

By car

From almost anywhere in the country, the best driving route to the convention is via the M1 Junction 21 - the junction with the M69.

From the M1 J21, take the A5460 towards Leicester for about 1/4 of a mile.


As you go under the A563, immediately turn off to the left, looping back on yourself, and going over the bridge you have just gone under, on the A563 (Leicester ring road) heading around the South of the city.

Follow the A563 for about 4 miles, until you get to the roundabout with the A6.

Take the second exit off the roundabout, turning right. Then immediately turn into the first road on the left - Stoughton Drive South.

After about 600m you come to a crossroads where you turn right onto Manor Road. The entrance to John Foster Hall is 300m on the left. The entrance to Stamford Court is on the right, directly opposite.

However it was always a struggle for Graeme to raise enough players even for two boards of Diplomacy, and playing three or four games against mainly the same people didn't really make for a sensible tournament.

Others, notably Toby, did try to raise interest, but ultimately attendance never met the levels that might have been suggested by those who said that they would come if such an event were to be organised.

It is probably premature to say that Diplomacy has had its day, as David Norman does heroically get enough people together for a few games over the course of the weekend at both MidCon and Manorcon, but, for those who want a serious tournament, there are really only WorldDipCon and EuroDipCon left.
